# The "circle" of life brings new species to the Big Sit!

Merrymeeting Audubon's 10<sup>th</sup> annual *The Big Sit!* took place between dawn and dusk on October 10, 2021 at Wharton Point in Brunswick. At this locale, a circle is centered around the monument rock overlooking Maquoit Bay.

A circle—17 feet in diameter, to be exact—is the observation center from which avid birders and curious passers-by will try to identify as many avian species as possible in the surrounding area. Of course there are certain guidelines to follow. Rule #1: observers must see or hear species while *remaining inside the circle*. These are the only observations that can be counted. Rule #2: If a bird is seen or heard, that can't be reliably identified (because of distance or obstacles), someone may leave the circle to get more accurate confirmation.

However, new species seen or heard while outside the circle cannot be counted unless someone *inside the circle* sees or hears it too.

Hazy sun, light southerly winds, and temperatures in the 50's to 60's provided great conditions for birding. The 12-hour effort produced 65 species, which resulted in the 3<sup>rd</sup> highest total at Wharton Point. Of the 65 species, two (a Lesser Scaup and an Eastern Meadowlark) were identified for the first time in ten years.

Many thanks go out to all who took part in the effort.

# **President's Perch**

northeastern Asia. The *Steller's Sea Eagle* has been viewed by hundreds of birders from Pennsylvania, Ohio, Texas, and all over the east coast. This eagle is a very large raptor (around 20 pounds with an 8-foot wing span) which has been seen in the eastern United States for awhile. A very rare treat, hopefully, many of you will still get to see it.

We are currently planning a full set of field trips and speaker programs this Spring, and hope that they can happen safely. April is our annual meeting,

when we elect our officers and board members. We always welcome new board members, so if you would be interested in taking an active role in the Merrymeeting Audubon Chapter, please consider joining our board. Our annual Christmas Bird Counts were successful! Luckily, the weather cooperated on December 18<sup>th</sup> for the West Bath-to-Boothbay

trek. We observed 79 species on the this count. Highlights included: Winter and Carolina Wrens, Savannah Sparrow, Iceland Gull, Common Grackle,



Dovekie, Pintail, Peregrine Falcons, and Ruffed Grouse. Such good luck weather did not follow us on the Brunswick-to-Freeport trip January 2<sup>nd</sup>. It was a cool, rainy day. We didn't see a lot of unusual species, but we noted a Mockingbird and Purple Sandpipers. The best view of the day was a Bald Eagle sitting just 15 feet above our heads as we looked out on the

bay. We didn't notice him until we were leaving, but he didn't seem to mind our presence.

Every CBC is different—weather conditions, folks attending, species counted. These events are still important to the birding world, and a wonderful source of fun and excitement! You never know what surprises are in store for

# **Experiences of a lifetime for** MMA scholarship campers

My second year at Hog Island was guite different from what I anticipated! I'd registered for the 2020 program, but COVID-19 caused all camp programs to be cancelled.

Merrymeeting Audubon graciously extended my scholarship for the 2021 camp, in hopes that the pandemic might be over. Despite the enormous difficulty of figuring out how to keep everyone safe, Audubon re-opened the camps in 2021 and I returned in July to the familiar sights, sounds, and faces of Hog Island in Bremen, Maine.

Complying with pandemic protocols, the camp staff implemented some changes. They merged the two teen birding camps into one. The protocols also precluded the usual van trips and shared living guarters (despite the large number of campers, there was ample housing with a bedroom for each individual).

We spent most of our time participating in hikes, lectures, and on-site activities guided by the camp leaders. Last, but not least, the amazing kitchen staff kept us wellfed, three meals a day.

The COVID protocols preempted our on-site visit to the famous Eastern Egg Rock this year, but we still made a boat trip out to Monhegan Island.

On Monhegan, we walked through the village, trails, and woods in search of birds, and documented breeding behaviors for the Maine Bird Atlas. From atop the rugged cliffs, facing the expansive Gulf of Maine, we observed a distant flock of Great Shearwaters on the water, and a Minke Whale surfaced several times. On returning to Hog Island, we had close-up views of a single Great Shearwater, and a pair of Northern Gannets flying by.

The most plentiful species in transit from island to island, were the Wilson's Storm-petrels. Dozens of them emerged from the thick fog and flew low over the water, some of them trailing the boat. These tiny seabirds

Our two weeks ended with bittersweet goodbyes, hugs and handshakes, not to mention a few tears. Though I felt a little melancholy about the departure, I was equally excited to finish the summer off and head into high school, ready to be a steward for nature, and equality.

Thanks to my Merrymeeting Audubon's camp scholarship, I enjoyed the chance to experience those amazing two weeks. The scholarship taught me so much about the importance of conservation, environmental impact, and teamwork. I intend to pay forward my gratitude by sharing my enthusiasm, and proving myself a leader among my peers. Tanglewood is such a special place that I hold close to my heart, and I look forward to returning each year.

Back on Hog Island, we kept busy with daily bird challenges, made the short hop to the mainland for a birdbanding demonstration, and some short hikes to search for breeding birds. By chance, we even met the legendary Dr. Steve Kress, founder of the monumental **Project Puffin** that restored Maine's population of Atlantic Puffins and other seabirds on Eastern Egg Rock and elsewhere.

One of the best parts of Hog Island camp is interacting with other young birders (in my age group) from all over the country, some with years of birding experience, and others who are just beginning.

Thanks to scholarships from MMA, I have thoroughly enjoyed my two years at Hog Island. My experience has been amazing each time! I hope to keep returning to Hog Island for as long as I can, or perhaps attend the National Audubon's Costa Rica teen week!

Program: Jeff Wells, The Biggest Bird Conservation Story You've Never Heard – the Boreal Forest of North America



One of the world's last, large intact forest regions is the Boreal Forest of North America, stretching from Alaska east to Newfoundland. Supporting between one and three billion birds, the Boreal Forest is aptly named North America's "Bird Nursery". Few people know that some of the world's largest land conservation actions, to protect birds and their habitats, are underway in the Boreal. Led by Indigenous governments and communities, they are forging new, exciting partnership and stewardship models. Much of the migratory and winter bird life of Maine comes from the Boreal Forest. National Audubon's Boreal Conservation program is working to conserve the Boreal Forest through some innovative, collaborative models with Indigenous peoples, and through modern research with partners like the Cornell Lab of Ornithology.

Jeffrey V. Wells , Ph.D., is the Vicepresident of Boreal Conservation for the National Audubon Society. His career can only be described as prolific and prestigious. In 1998, Jeff published "Important Bird Areas in New York State", a highly acclaimed handbook to determine the highestpriority bird conservation areas, for use by state and federal agencies, land trusts, and others.

Jeff spent the subsequent decades accruing extensive experiences with Audubon, the Cornell Lab of Ornithology (where he continues as an

Associate of the Lab), the International Boreal Conservation Campaign and Boreal Song Initiative. He is an active birder, and for 12 years was a member of the Cornell Lab of Ornithology's Sapsuckers birding team, which won the prestigious World Series of Birding in 2001 and 2002. His birding expertise comprises much of North America (Northwest Territories to Mexico), the Lesser Antilles, Aruba, Bonaire, and Curacao. He and his wife, Allison Childs Wells, have created the websites www.arubabirds.com and www.bonairebirds.com, additionally co-authoring several, significant books on birds and conservation issues.

### Program: Michael Boardman, "Drawing the Arctic"



In spring of 2019 North Yarmouth wildlife artist Michael Boardman was selected to be the artist in residence for Arctic National Wildlife Refuge. He was flown to the coastal plain of the refuge in June to spend 2 weeks at the Canning River Bird Camp, helping the ornithologists there study all the migrating birds breeding on the tundra. ### Program: Derek Lovitch, "Birding Cuba: From Che's Cave to Zapata Swamp

Just before the pandemic shut down travel in 2020, Derek and Jeannette travelled to Cuba on a birding trip and will share photos and stories from the trip.

Derek Lovitch has made a career out of his lifelong passion for birds. He and his wife, Jeannette, own and operate Freeport Wild Bird Supply, a retail store that caters to birders of all levels. The store serves as a vehicle for Derek to continue sharing his enthusiasm for birding, birds, and bird conservation.

Derek and Jeannette founded the Bradbury Mountain Raptor Research Project. They are active with many birding and conservation issues in Maine. Yet, he still finds to time to bird just about every day—whether as a Senior Leader for WINGS, guiding for private clients, or simply working on his local patch list. Hardly a day goes by when he isn't in the field.

Derek's first book, "How To Be a Better Birder", was published in March 2012 by the Princeton University Press. His second book, "Birdwatching in Maine", has just been published (May 2017) by the University Press of New England. He was also the "Tools of the Trade" Department Editor for "Birding" magazine for 6 years, and his writing has also appeared in Birder's World, Bird Observer, Bird Watcher's Digest, NJ Audubon, and Winging It.


