A bird by any other name. . . .

In November 2023, the American Ornithological Society (AOS) announced a plan to change the eponymic bird names — those named after people — in the US and Canada. The announcement comes after years of work by the AOS, holding listening sessions, meeting with stakeholders, and ultimately deciding that naming birds after people is a useless and outdated practice. The AOS will convene a committee and engage the public to find new names for eponymic birds over the coming years.

There are fourteen eponymic birds that regularly occur in Maine, including Wilson's Storm-Petrel, Cooper's Hawk, Bicknell's Thrush, and others. Though the AOS's announcement was met with

criticism from some, the overwhelming response from Maine Audubon staff has been excitement: we get to think of new, better names!

In December 2023, Maine Audubon's Doug Hitchcox and Nick Lund hosted a webinar to debate some new potential names for Maine birds. Here were some of their suggestions:

- Barrow's Goldeneye to Crescent-faced Goldeneye. The moonshaped mark on the drake duck's face is by far the easiest field mark.
- Bicknell's Thrush to Summit Thrush. A hike to mountaintop breeding grounds is the defining memory of searching for this thrush.
- Bonaparte's Gull to Tree Gull. This dapper species is the only gull that nests in trees.
- Blackburnian Warbler to Firefaced Warbler. Recognizing the brilliant field-mark of this warbler.

These are just our own suggestions, of course, but it was fun to think about these familiar birds from a new angle. Stay tuned to learn more about any formal suggestions coming out of the AOS and ways to get involved.

Birds on the Wing in AMC's Maine Woods

In March of this year, "The 30 Year Bird Study: The role of Maine's commercial forests for regional and national bird conservation, 1992-2022" was released. This document reports on a study originally conducted in 1992 and repeated in 2022 to give a 30-year view of bird densities in the northern Maine Woods. Appalachian Mountain Club is proud to have been a partner on this study.

North American breeding bird populations have fallen by 30% since 1970, primarily due to habitat loss and degradation. Maine's commercial forest landscape is the largest intact forest east of the Mississippi, and a key part of the globally significant important Bird Area in the lower 48 states. This study sought to understand what role AMC's

Maine Woods may play in maintaining bird populations.

The result?

70% of the bird species analyzed in the study *increased* in population—contrasting sharply with data from the same timeframe which shows those same species declined by 75% elsewhere in the United States. The study says this suggests that "somewhat different forces are at play in the commercial forest of Maine relative to the rest [of] North America".

This could be because AMC's large, intact woods function as a land-scape-scale refuge for birds, providing vital connected habitat in a time of loss and degradation.

Further study is needed to understand more about this important bird habitat, but for now, we know that protecting AMC's Maine Woods is bringing birdsong back to the forest.

Field Trip: Rachel Carson National Wildlife Refuge, (southern coastal Maine)

The Rachel Carson Refuge was established to protect estuarine and salt marsh habitat in southern coastal Maine for migrating birds. Join leader Glenn Evans as we search for fall migrants at several Refuge Divisions.

Meet at 8:00 a.m. at the Rachel Carson Administrative Headquarters parking area, 321 Port Rd. in Wells. To get to the Admin. Headquarters, take I-95 to Exit 19 (Wells). From Exit 19, turn left onto Route 9/109. At the stop light, turn left onto Post Rd (Rte. 1 North). Just past the Maine Diner, turn right onto Port Rd. (Route 9) and follow for approximately 3/4 mile. Turn right into the Refuge entrance. From there we'll drive to several locations.
